HOPE for Challenging Times

We are experiencing a most unusual time in our nation's history – banks struggling, recession well under way, people losing jobs (including some of our own Redeemer people). Anxiety, fear, depression are way more common. Paradoxically, reports indicate that the number of people who have no religious faith has nearly doubled in the past 20 years. The one source of comfort to which people in similar circumstances turned 80 years ago is unavailable to them. Even people professing faith in Jesus are less likely to attend weekly worship than was the case two decades ago. While they haven't forgotten about God, they have pushed Him to the margins of their lives the result that increasingly their faith relationship with the Lord Jesus is having less influence in people's lives.

Yet we are entering into the most hopeful season of the year. Not because the tulips and daffodils and trees are blooming. Not because it is daylight savings time and the sun sets an hour-plus later. This season is hopeful because we refocus our lives around the ONE who gave up His life for us and then on the third day arose. We are not assured of a safe world, free of the brokenness of sin. We are assured of a God who loves us and walks through all our doubts, our fears, our anxieties, our sadnesses with us. He took ALL of the effects of the sin-stained world to the cross and then rose victoriously that we might have hope. The comfort He provides is not that our circumstances will always be comfortable but that HE will be our Comfort. He is the one who invites, *"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."* He is the One who carried His own cross and died to lighten our burdens. He rose to give us ultimate victory over all life's negatives – the biggest negative being sin itself.

WHY THE RIGHT CHEEK?

It seems like a detail that Jesus included to make his words appear more realistic and vivid, like saying, "I stubbed my big, right toe," instead of, "I hurt my foot." Words carry more weight and have a bigger impact when you use details. Thus, Jesus is telling us not to fight back against someone who wants to hurt us, that violence won't solve anything, or that following him means getting slapped a lot. ***That is, until we consider the anatomy of a slap...***

Open your hand so that it is flat, and imagine someone standing in front of you, in desperate need of a good slapping. Now, picture your hand connecting with their face – if it helps, you can always use a friend as a test subject. As you make contact with their cheek, which side of their face have you just slapped, from their perspective? Yup, that's correct: their ***left*** cheek.

To slap someone's *right* cheek, you either have to be swinging south-paw or you have to use the back of your right hand. However, in Jesus' day, no one used his or her left hand in public, not even to hit someone. Never. People considered the left hand to be "unclean" and only used it for "unclean" things. I'll leave that one for you to figure out on your own.

Since our south-paw option is out because all slapping was done with the right hand, we can tell that Jesus was actually talking about a *back-handed* slap. I don't know if you've ever been back-handed, but it doesn't hurt *that* much. Hitting someone's cheek with the back of the hand isn't going to do much damage, so today we use fists, instead. But it did carry a profound meaning for Jesus' culture. Masters hit slaves, Romans hit Jews, Fathers hit sons, and men hit women (sad to say) ***with the backs of their hands***. It communicated a message of status, that the person being hit was fundamentally inferior to the person doing the hitting. Period. It meant that he was better than you.

Now imagine being backhanded in the year 26 AD; your right cheek stings a little bit, and someone just publicly demonstrated that he was superior to you in every way. He was most likely right as far as society was concerned, and this means that any attempt to fight back or retaliate could end up with imprisonment, flogging, or execution. You are stuck, forced to acknowledge that the person hitting you is more important, more valuable, and categorically better than you... **unless there was another way...**

Instead of bowing your head and “getting back in your place,” you look him in the eye and then turn to your right, offering him your left cheek to slap as well. This time, your nose obstructs the all-important backhand. It won’t work, and even if it did, it just wouldn’t be the same as the first slap. Like putting a bucket of water at the top of the doorframe, it just isn’t that funny a second time around.

Now, the person who is set on telling you that you are worthless can’t refuse a free hit - that would mean disgrace. But he can’t hit you with the demeaning backhand, either, because the way you are offering your cheek makes it impossible. You, who are considered sub-human by the surrounding culture, have taken control of the situation.

Your attacker/de-humanizer now has a choice: 1) walk away, and appear like a coward because he didn’t have the fortitude to strike someone that was vastly inferior to himself, or 2) throw a punch at your left cheek – which, culturally speaking, is how he would hit someone **who is equal to himself.**

The attacker either has to admit that he doesn’t think you are less of a person (walking away), or he has to demonstrate that you are his equal (throwing a punch). For a culture that was literally built on the *inequality* of all people and operated on the basis of social class and standing, this kind of action tears everything apart.

Jesus is telling this to people who were oppressed on a daily basis. They experienced oppression on a large scale from the Roman Empire which was kind enough to occupy their country, as well as from individuals using their socio-economic status for their own pleasure. Jesus’ words are brilliant.

He gave the people methods to force oppressive men and women to recognize the validity and sanctity of a fellow human being. An oppressor could either walk away like a coward or treat them as an equal, but they could NOT continue backhanding and demeaning.

This kind of creative, nonviolent response shatters worlds. It denies the accepted truth that we have to play by *their* rules in order to win and forces everyone around to recognize that in God’s Kingdom, we all matter.

The next time someone blasts you with the verbal equivalent of a backhand, demeaning, dehumanizing, and belittling you with their words, **what might it look like to turn the other cheek?** In other words, how might you creatively offer yourself in a way that forces them to reconsider the way they have treated you, **without attacking back?** The beauty behind Jesus’ words is that it gives the attacker the opportunity to consider that maybe the person they just slapped is a real human being, too. So how does that look?

MOUNT SINAI OR MOUNT ZION

*Which Is It for a Believer?
Hebrews 12, 18-24*

The author of the New Testament Letter to the Hebrews answers the above question in chapter 12:18-24. For all believers in Jesus Christ which is it - Mt. Sinai or Mt. Zion? In verse 18 he states, "You have not come to a mountain (Mt. Sinai which still carries this name today) where God Himself appeared to His people, Israel, where He gave them His Ten Commandments (Exodus 20), the mountain which then blazed with fire, and lightning flashes and thunder and a very loud trumpet (Exodus 19:16), the mountain where God spoke His Ten Commandments (Exodus 20), "and those who heard begged that no further word should be spoken to them" (Hebrews 12:19). So awesome was this Mt. Sinai experience that even Moses said, "I am full of fear and trembling" (Hebrews 12:21).

There actually was a Mt. Zion, one of the hills on which Jerusalem stood. Later the name Mt. Zion embraced the entire temple area, and still later, the whole of Jerusalem.

What does the writer of the Epistle to the Hebrews mean when he says that for all of us who believe in Jesus Christ as our Savior and Lord, this Mt. Sinai is NOT our mountain? He means that God's salvation plan for us is not there at Mt. Sinai. Salvation is not procured by our keeping the Ten Commandments, because not one of us can keep the commandments perfectly, and yet that is what God demands - perfection.

Now the writer to the Hebrews says revealingly (12:22), "But you have come to MT.ZION." Where is Mt. Zion? It's not an actual mountain on any continent anywhere (as far as I know). Mt. Zion is JESUS CHRIST AND HIS SALVATION WORK (12:24). Mt. Zion is "the general assembly and church of the first born who are enrolled in heaven (12:23), the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints. Mt. Zion is the place of "the sprinkled blood" (12:24), Calvary, where Jesus shed His blood, endured the punishment of hell for every person, crying out, "My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken me?" Mt. Zion is the place of the "spirits of righteous men made perfect" (12:23), the believers who are made perfect by Jesus' keeping the commandments perfectly in our stead, so that we who believe in Jesus are declared by the Father to be perfect and forgiven. Mt. Zion is where God's salvation plan for all is revealed.

Mount Zion - what a fantastic, wonderful, beautiful, soul satisfying mountain = not a real mountain of rock and soil and height, and yet a REAL mountain, higher than any mountain anywhere, the place where sinners come to exchange their sinfulness for the perfection Jesus offers.

"You have not come to Mt. Sinai", says the writer to the Hebrews. No salvation there! The salvation mountain is Mt. ZION! Here we find the full love of God fulfilled in us, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in Him, should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). I'm so happy and thankful that the Holy Spirit has led me to this mountain, MT. ZION. Aren't you? Shout it loudly, 'I LOVE THY ZION, LORD."

SHARING THE VISION – FORWARD IN MISSION

The current three-year capital funding campaign is off to a great start. In the first three months of the campaign (December 2008 – February 2009) contributions totaled \$58,146. The three-year financial commitments totaled \$437,676. While the total pledges are less than what was needed to complete the goals of having dedicated child care areas for preschoolers and for infants as well as a dedicated area for the return of the Holy Grounds Café and the build-out of the administrative center, the Board of Directors is working on options that can help us meet our long-term goal. Interim options will be on the table for discussion by the Board. The overall strategic plan would then be brought before the congregation for its comment.

PENINSULA ASIAN MISSION SOCIETY (PAMS) UPDATE

On March 8, 2009 at Trinity Lutheran Church in Burlingame, Pastor David Chan updated members of PAMS on his work as a mission pastor. Pastor David has been working with a growing group of Chinese people through the food pantry program at Bethel-Grace in San Francisco. The food pantry serves about 250 people each Saturday except for the 3 Saturdays near Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Years. About 150 people attend a Bible study led by Pastor David prior to the opening of the food pantry each Saturday. It is exciting and encouraging to see that the number of people who attend the Bible study is increasing. Those who attend the Bible study are not given special preference to be first in line to receive food. However, many have discovered the importance of receiving spiritual food as they faithfully return each week to get nourishment from God's Word.



Grace Lutheran Church sponsored several events last year (Halloween party, Thanksgiving luncheon, and Christmas party). For each of these events, Pastor David extended an invitation to all who came to the food pantry. At the Thanksgiving luncheon, about 50% of the attendees were church members with the other 50% being non-church members. Those non-church members were from the food pantry, and a handful of them were regulars at the Saturday morning Bible study. These numbers were found to be fairly consistent at other church events.

Pastor David started a weekday evening small group Bible study. Currently, there are 6-7 people attending. Many of them have committed themselves to receiving Christ as their Lord and Savior but are not ready to make the final commitment in Baptism. Pastor David attributed this to the strong cultural influence of not going against your family's desire.

Through the work of Pastor David, seeds are planted not just here on the Peninsula but also in Beijing, China. A few years ago, Pastor David had the opportunity to baptize Anna. She has since returned to Beijing. She is now attending church and Bible study in Beijing and commits herself to sharing the Gospel of Jesus to others in her country. We praise God for how He has blessed the work of Pastor David. We want to thank Redeemer Congregation for supporting PAMS, and thanks to many of you who consistently pray for this mission.
